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Consistent leadership the key

Mayor Jock Barker, Cr Paul Kelly and Cr Jill Goetze have dedicated a collective 68 years of service and contribution to the vision of a sustainable, flourishing and connected community.

This significant commitment emphasizes their loyalty; having all resided in the municipality for multiple decades, they have each seen the community and amenities flourish over this time. This consistent leadership has seen the Town build confidence and strengthen its effectiveness through good governance.

Mayor Jock Barker is the Town of Claremont's longest serving Mayor in its history. He said "I feel privileged to have the confidence of residents who have re-elected me a number of times."

The Mayor said that he had spent his entire life in and around Claremont and enjoyed representing the Town, having a strong connection to the area.

"The Town's sense of community felt from the residents, business owners, volunteers and Council staff is something to be appreciated. I greatly value the general ambiance of the area and the proximity to the river and the sea". Cr Jill Goetze, a third generation Claremont resident said, "I love the connected community feel of living in Claremont. I love being part of the local community where there is a sense of the village lifestyle with care and support for everyone who lives here."

Cr Paul Kelly was inspired to run for Council to create impact as there was a number of local issues which he considered would be detrimental to the broader community, he said he had "A desire to become involved in maintaining the wonderful attributes of the town while being actively involved in creating the future".

When asked about their challenge for the future of Claremont, the three Elected Members unanimously agreed they hoped the inevitable growth in property development would be able to be managed in a wellplanned and in an integrated manner so Claremont could retain its historic village feel.





Squad goals

Claremont Football Club's Youth Girls Development Squad have hit the ground running with the Town proudly onboard as its Community Partner.

The program provides young girls who demonstrate a passion and talent for Aussie rules the opportunity to further develop and nurture their skills, and following the recent win of the Premiership flag by the Club's WAFL Women's team, this is something to aspire to.

The extended squad includes 65 players who train every week at the Revo Fitness Stadium. Come mid-September, a final 30 squad members are selected to continue in the team, which includes three players based in the Kimberley.

The final team will go on to play games against other West Australian Football League clubs in the school holidays.

Team Coach Luci Fransen said the squad's focus for 2024 is to continue to improve the girls football skills and knowledge. "We cover off educational pieces after every training session to include topics like strength and conditioning, injury prevention and management, game planning and terminology. The girls are all so eager to learn and it is so rewarding to see them all progress each week," she said.

Sabi Jordaan, second-year squad member and local high-school student, was thrilled when she was nominated by her club coach. "I was so excited as I knew it was an amazing opportunity to develop my game. I love the team aspect of footy and the number of friends I've made through it," Sabi said.

When Sabi is not playing footy she loves participating in other sports including netball, softball, swimming, and surfing. When asked for her favourite place to refuel after a big game, Sabi answered, "Miss Chows is always a favourite followed by a bubble tea at Chaffic".

A community partnership such as that of the Town's helps keep the club at a WAFL grade facility, as well as providing equipment like new footballs for the program.

A range of species are available to select from and plaques can be included with a special message.

The Cammack Family selected a Dwarf Sugar Gum, a beautiful evergreen Australian native tree that is noted for its grey and yellow cream bark.

The tree will mark as a special tribute to Sarah Cammack and be an addition to the Town's leafy green tree canopy. The Adopt a Tree program, in addition to an increase in Council funded planting it is assisting in replenishing the tree canopy following the destruction of the polyphagous shot-hole borer.

With a little help from my friends

If you have enjoyed the glorious natural surrounds of Lake Claremont, there is a good chance you have seen the Friends of Lake Claremont group hard at work at this Conservation Category Wetland and Bush Forever Site.

Since 2010 Nick Cook has been a board member of the Friends group. And after 14 years with close to 400,000 plants planted, Nick has recently passed the role of coordinator onto Tony Barr, a qualified Hydrogeologist.

Tony begun volunteering with the Friends of Lake Claremont six years ago. Tony explained, "I first heard about the group when I saw them carrying out their winter weeding efforts and offered to help. The priorities are to continue to preserve and enhance the flora and fauna that benefits greatly from efforts of the many volunteers", he said. Nick Cook described the Friends of Lake Claremont as, "Very much a group of friends, not just a friend of the lake but a social, passionate, positive group of people and they are inspiring to be around. We always have a great morning tea after all our events", he said.

Volunteers on the ground and behind the scenes are always welcome and local school groups are often seen lending a hand.

Fashion, flares and fondue

Do you remember the grooviest time in Claremont?

The 1970s were a pivotal decade in Australia, defined by colour and chaos. Fashion was eclectic. Fondue parties were all the rage. Shag carpets, sunken loungerooms and bold patterns featured in even the most modest homes. Colour television arrived, and popular movies included Star Wars, Jaws and The Godfather. While ABBA, Marvin Gaye and Skyhooks were some of the bands being blasted on cassette tapes, the Sony Walkman had arrived by the end of the decade.

Here in Claremont, the growing population and arrival of migrants to the Grayland's Migrant Hostel, led to a need for more facilities, shops and housing. The Claremont Museum, Aquatic Centre and Library were all established, and the last of the houses on St Quentin Avenue were demolished to make way for more shops.

Cr Kate Main said of the era, "I remember miniskirts, long white socks and driving down to Bovell's Pies in Bayview Terrace in our gun metal grey 'Beetle' and having a pie as a treat. In the 70's, Bayview Terrace was a two-way street with parking out the front of the shop".

To celebrate and reflect on this groovy decade, the Town has curated a special commemorative exhibition 'Made in the 70's' opening on 3 October, at the Claremont Museum.

Trails to trial

Add some spring to your step and discover rich history and our local natural assets through a series of local walking trails.

With the warmer weather upon us, take the opportunity to learn about your area with friends and family. Go at your own pace with a wide range of self-guided walks.

Whether you are new to Claremont, or have been a resident for many years, there is something for everyone to experience and enjoy.

Bush to Beach

The Bush to Beach Trail lies on Whadjuk Noongar Land, connecting remnant bushland areas in the western suburbs of Perth. This is a 16km walk so could be enjoyed in sections over a few weekends.

Historic Tales – Claremont Meanders

The Yargine Track

This trail takes you on a journey around Lake Claremont and through the beautiful, hilly streets of Swanbourne with much history to explore on the way.

Cobblers and Convicts

A trail that will take you through one of Claremont's oldest residential areas. You will meander past the site of the Convict Depot, marvel at some of the Town's most historically significant buildings and explore the beauty of Freshwater Bay.

Trail of Memories

This trail explores the different stages of Claremont's development history with Federation and Post War era housing providing a tangible reminder of Claremont's past.


Learn about the beginnings of the Claremont Town Centre, how it has evolved over the years, and the people and businesses that have made its history so intriguing.

Youth

Residents between the age of 12 – 18 can apply for up to \$200 in financial assistant towards expenses related to representing at a state or national level across sporting, academic, leadership, performing arts and cultural pursuits.

The Claremont Community Funding Program provides financial assistance to groups and individuals who aim to benefit the Town by encouraging social activity, vibrancy, community participation and sustainability within Claremont.

Businesses

The Town of Claremont Night-time Activation is a grants program for businesses in Claremont to deliver exciting night-time offerings that support the local economy after 6pm.

Cat Owners

The Town's Catio Grant Program supports the building of enclosed areas in backyards for domestic cats, allowing them to spend time outside without the risk of harming native wildlife.


